In memoriam Stuart Munro-Hay (1947–2004)

The numismatist and éthiopisant Stuart Christopher Munro-Hay was born on 21 April 1947 in Northern Ireland. He died at the age of 57 on 14 October 2004 in Thailand. He is well known as a prolific researcher and writer on the history and archaeology of Ethiopia, but only a few knew him well enough to be able to write a substantial obituary.² The following bibliography, based on a list provided by David Phillipson, enlarged and updated by *Aethiopica*, is presented in commemoration of a prominent scholar of our field.

In memoriam Friedrich Heyer (1908–2005)

Pastor Professor Dr. Dr. h.c. Friedrich Heyer ist am 10. April 2005 im Alter von 97 Jahren in Schleswig verstorben. Er war bis zu seiner Emeritierung 1976 Professor für Konfessionskunde an der Theologischen Fakultät der Ruprecht-Karls-Universität Heidelberg, Deutschland.

Friedrich Heyer wurde am 24. Januar 1908 in Darmstadt geboren. Er verlor früh seine Eltern und wuchs bei seiner Großmutter auf. Nach seinem Studium der Evangelischen Theologie in Tübingen und Göttingen war er 1932–1934 Schloßprediger auf Schloß Ernstbrunn in Niederösterreich und 1934–1954 Pfarrer der Sankt Michaelis Gemeinde in Schleswig. Während seiner Amtszeit wurde er 1938 an der Universität in Göttingen promoviert (*Der Kirchenbegriff der Schwärmer*, Leipzig 1939). 1951 habilitierte er sich mit einer Arbeit im Fach Neuere Kirchengeschichte und Auslandskirchenkunde in Kiel (*Die orthodoxe Kirche in der Ukraine von 1917 bis 1945*, Köln-Braunsfeld 1953). Im gleichen Jahr wurde er Privatdozent für Neuere Kirchengeschichte an der Theologischen Fakultät der Universität Kiel. Zeitgleich war er ab 1954 Studienleiter der Evangelischen Akademie Schleswig-Holstein. 1964 wurde er auf den neu errichteten Lehrstuhl für Konfessionskunde der Heidelberger Universität berufen, wo er nach seiner Emeritierung noch weiter lehrte. H.s Interesse an der Orthodoxie wurde während des 2. Weltkrieges geweckt; er war als Soldat u.a. in Rußland und der Ukraine stationiert und knüpfte dort Kontakte zu Geistlichen beider Kirchen. Später organisierte er in Schleswig Kolloquien mit Vertretern der orthodoxen
